COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

The City's Community Development Division partners with local agencies to carry out and leverage funds to meet our community goals. The Division is expanding our impact in a variety of ways--with new initiatives in the works, by responding to urgent needs, and forming long range partnerships in the community. Below are some of those highlighted in the 2022 Annual Action Plan.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING -

Affordable and Attainable Housing Fee Offset Program - This new program provides development and utility fee offsets for new affordable and attainable multi-family rental projects.

Displacement Prevention for Low-Income Seniors - This program will provide rental assistance for up to two years for seniors who are at risk of displacement.





NEIGHBORHOOD IMPROVEMENTS _____

Investment in the Southeast - Implement health equity recommendations from the upcoming SoutheastStrong neighborhood plan.

Support District 11 - Complement Colorado Springs D11's facility improvement plan by addressing neighborhood conditions

Grant Awards - Support public health and housing needs through CDBG Public Facilities and Infrastructure grant awards. Applications open in February 2022.

COVID-19 Homeless Shelter - Continua oparating an isolation shalter for homeless clients with symptoms of or a diagnosis of

Grant Awards - Address homelessness and housing stability needs through CDBG Public Services and ESG grant awards. Applications open in March 2022.







CDBG Program Budget Details

- Administrative and public services are capped by law
- Economic development: \$176,000 toward microenterprise assistance
- Public facilities/infrastructure (\$884,000) and public services (\$503,000) to be awarded competitively in Spring 2022
- Affordable housing (\$1.2 million) for homeowner rehabilitation, barrier removals, emergency repair, CSHA accessibility rehab

 Administrative costs are capped by law

Expected outcomes

- 40 senior and formerly homeless households assisted rental subsidies
- 593 new units
- 95 units rehabilitated
- 15 units supported via acquisition
