GENERAL PURPOSE

To advance public safety, community trust, and the highest purposes of law enforcement and to recommend positive, evidence-based police transparency and accountability practices.

Note: Colorado Springs City Charter provides that the civilian, popularly elected Mayor oversees all policies and day to day operations of the CSPD. The Committee would make recommendations to Council who in turn could choose to adopt some or all of these as recommendations to present to the Mayor.

ALTERNATIVE APPROACHES (ONE OR BOTH)

Acknowledge independent Exploratory Panel on Police Transparency and Accountability Establish formal City Council Committee

- Open records and open meetings required
- Staff support required

AUSTIN GROUP PRESENTATION ON EXPLORATORY PANEL ON POLICE TRANSPARENCY AND ACCOUNTABILITY

COUNCIL OPTIONS

- One option is to acknowledge work of Austin Group and await the recommendations of their Exploratory Panel on Police Transparency and Accountability.
- Alternatively, City Council may want to establish an additional formal City Committee to seek input from the Exploratory Panel on Police Transparency and Accountability and others in the community.

FORMAL COUNCIL COMMITTEE GOALS

- 1. Review CSPD's policies and practices.
- 2. Using input from the Austin Group's Exploratory Panel on Police Transparency and Accountability and others, examine best practices in police transparency, accountability, and other policies and procedures, recognizing such practices that may be in place at CSPD.
- 3. Provide the communities most impacted, the Colorado Springs City Council, the Mayor, CSPD, and the larger city of Colorado Springs reliable information on positive practices that may improve police outcomes.
- 4. Make evidence-based recommendations for the adaptation and implementation of other positive practices to improve policing outcomes and relationships between law enforcement and the community.

FORMAL COMMITTEE TYPE? – 2 IN RULES

- RECOMMENDATION: 5-1. COUNCIL BOARDS, COMMITTEES, AND COMMISSIONS. Council boards, committees, and commissions are generally advisory in nature to assist Council and staff by preparing recommendations for Council decision. Board, committee, and commission members may not speak or act for Council except when formally given such authority for specific purposes. Council boards, committees, and commissions cannot exercise authority over staff without specific authority from the Council. Members of boards, committees, and commissions shall be selected in accord with the provisions of the ordinance creating the board, committee, or commission from within El Paso County and shall serve without compensation....
- Alternative: 5-2. PRESIDENT'S BOARDS, COMMITTEES, AND COMMISSIONS. The President may appoint special boards, committees, or commissions composed of Councilmembers and/or citizens to assist in the study of items before the Council. A working group so appointed shall serve until the matter is disposed of by the Council unless sooner terminated by the President.

- Note: staff support will be necessary from Council Staff, City Attorney, CSPD (including Amanda Terrell-Orr), and potentially City Auditor and other parts of administration (such as human resources).
