Members of the Colorado Springs City Council,

We are Charles L. Campbell & Deborah R. Adams, and have lived at 37 Lake Avenue for nearly 17 years. We are concerned that the proposed expansion of the Broadmoor Hotel Event Center will result in a number of negative impacts on the neighborhood, and we are asking you to consider our thoughts as you review the appeal of the Development Plan Major Amendment (CPC DP03-00259-A10MJ19). We are most concerned about two general areas: **traffic/parking impacts** and area **evacuation** during an emergency.

Traffic: During the most recent Space Symposium, we purposely drove a number of times west on Lake Avenue and right onto Lake Circle past the access to the exhibition spaces to see how the traffic was during the symposium. We are used to periodic delays due to hotel traffic and hotel guests crossing back and forth from the hotel; however, we observed a substantial increase in both kinds of traffic during the recent symposium. Additionally, the increased traffic past our house during the symposium was substantial, including numerous 15 person vans, 56 person buses and 60 person school buses. We therefore believe that, with a very significant increase in exhibit space and without any meaningful change to traffic or pedestrian patterns, the impacts to the neighborhood will be unacceptable.

Contrary to our first hand observations, the conclusion of the traffic study completed by SM Rocha, LLC, the Broadmoor Hotel's traffic consultant, states:

"It is our professional opinion that the proposed site-generated traffic resulting from the additional building area is expected to create no negative impact to traffic operations for the surrounding roadway network and existing site access. Analysis of site-generated traffic concludes that proposed development traffic volume is minor."

We believe that describing the site generated traffic as having "no negative impact" and being "minor" is not accurate. Our observations are based on personal experience in the neighborhood over the years we have lived here.

<u>**Parking:**</u> During the past 17 years, we have seen that attendees at Broadmoor events very often park on neighborhood streets in spite of the availability of hotel onsite parking. The proposed plan includes information about how the parking related to increased attendance at events is to be handled. We believe that it is unrealistic to expect that all attendees are going to be willing to park remotely and utilize the described shuttles provided for larger events. During the recent Space Symposium we observed a substantial increase in on street parking.

Here is another statement in the traffic consultant's study:

"The Broadmoor will coordinate with adjacent neighborhoods in order to prevent event parking along public streets within adjacent neighborhoods."

Similarly, the Broadmoor Hotel Exhibit Hall Project Statement indicates:

"...the Broadmoor will develop and implement parking management strategies including but not limited to ...(3) Working cooperatively with adjacent neighborhoods to prevent event parking on public streets within the surrounding neighborhoods"

However, in the responses to public comments compiled by NES, the Broadmoor Hotel's planning consultant, the following caveat appears:

"Neighborhood streets are part of the City's public right-of-way and therefore the Broadmoor's ability to control and enforce parking in the neighborhood is limited. The Broadmoor is committed to participating in conversations with the City and neighborhood residents to address neighborhood parking concerns and explore and management solutions that restrict parking in the neighborhood"

There is nothing in the parking consultant's study nor in the Broadmoor Hotel's Project Statement to indicate how the Broadmoor intends to "coordinate with the surrounding neighborhoods" to alleviate the on street parking problem. There are no existing neighborhood organizations in place that are empowered to act on behalf of the residents. Furthermore, in the NES response quoted above, it is recognized that the Broadmoor and the residents do not have the power to enter into agreements to limit the described parking. It is the City that is so empowered. We are therefore concerned as to how this parking dilemma can realistically be solved.

<u>Emergency Evacuation</u>: The Broadmoor Hotel, the City and this area's residents are painfully aware that this is a Wild Land Urban Interface. It is not a matter of IF, but rather WHEN wildfires will occur! A few years ago, the Broadmoor applied to close Cheyenne Mtn Blvd where is bisects a hotel golf course. This application was denied after much study, primarily because such a road closure would very seriously and negatively impact residents' ability to quickly evacuate in the event of a wildfire.

Residents everywhere have been encouraged by different entities to take wildfire precautions to heart, and to take various measures to make all our lives and properties safer should they be threatened by wildfire. These precautions include making our own evacuation plans, and we have done so. However, we are unaware of the nature of the Broadmoor and City wildfire emergency evacuation plans, and how the proposed expansion might negatively impact the safety of Broadmoor residents in the event of wildfire.

<u>What we are asking</u>: We believe that the Broadmoor Hotel is moving forward too rapidly with its efforts to expand its exhibition facilities. We ask that the City Council look at our concerns as described above, along with the concerns of other residents who are commenting on this appeal, and carefully consider our observations. We believe that further study by the City Planning Department of these issues is called for, and we ask the City Council to support the appeal by returning the matter to the City Planning Department for further review of residents' concerns.
