

Synchronist is database utilized by the Business Alliance for industry monitoring. **Business Climate Survey** is conducted every other year by Summit Economics for Cheyenne Mountain Civic Solutions. **IMPLAN** is an econometric model proprietary to the Minnesota IMPLAN Group.



Main Components of the Sector

 The Health, Wellness & Medical Innovations Sector is rather broad. Research for this report considered Health and Wellness as one subsector and Medical Innovations as another subsector.

Health

Primarily comprised of hospitals and direct care health providers

Wellness

An emerging sector providing alternative approaches to healthcare –
more along the line of alternative medical practices and lifestyle choices.

Medical Innovations

 Typically referred to as biosciences, medical devices, and digital health, in Colorado Springs the industry is dominated by medical device manufacturing

Payroll

- The sector employs over 34,000 people directly, and is responsible for another 17,000 indirect and induced jobs.
- The direct payroll is approximately \$1.95 billion with average annual earnings exceeding \$56,000.
- The total payroll (direct, indirect & induced) created by this sector exceeds \$2.7 billion, with average earnings of more than \$52,000 per year.

Concluded 5 Year Forecast

The Pikes Peak region appears well positioned to take advantage of rapidly emerging trends in the Health, Wellness, and Medical Innovations sector. When combined with the area's history in medical tourism and outdoor lifestyles, the presence of the United States Olympic Committee and sports national governing bodies, a high incidence of military retirees and veterans, and a strong presence in information technology, the region should outperform the nation in both sector growth rates and innovation and start-up activity.



Vision

 - Sports Tourism
 - Investment has started:
 - CU Medical Center & UCCS campus
 - Fits with other sectors:
 - Digital Health (emerging)
 - Sports IT (mature and growing)
 - Cyber Security (nationally, COS is a Top 10 location)
- Requires separating the primary health, wellness and medical innovations subsector from its retail subsector
