*Pikes Peak region is loosely defined as El Paso, Teller, and Fremont Counties



The Why



Our iconic landscapes and abundant recreation opportunities contribute to quality of life and economic vitality



Unprecedented front-range growth = threats to natural resources and recreational experiences



Outdoor infrastructure - overrun and insufficient for the demand



Land managers under-resourced for the magnitude of the challenges



The need for planning - never more important to balance natural resources and recreation experiences



Rare opportunity for local communities to inform state priorities and funding (Usually top-down focus)




- 100+ regional and statewide plans researched and analyzed

Pikes Peak Region Application

1. Narrow focus vs. broad perspective A trail has specific management criteria that may not apply to diverse recreation activities in the Pikes Peak Region. Not all trail management practices apply to other forms of recreation or natural resource management.

2. Large amount of organization and structure required for the level of volunteer involvement

Arkansas Headwaters Recreation Area

Location: Colorado Size: 150 miles

Established: 1989 Land Manager: BLM and Colorado Parks & Wildlife

Partners: BLM, CPW, USFS Model: Government Fee: Varies per use

The Arkansas Headwaters Recreation Area (AHRA) was created in 1989 with the passage of Colorado State House Bill 1253.

Colorado Parks and Wildlife (CPW) manages the recreation under a Cooperative Management Agreement (CMA) with the BLM and U.S. Forest Service (USFS) and includes the Cooperative Management Lands (CML), which is a defined area adjacent to the river where recreation related activities occur.

Through this partnership, the AHRA provides visitors with outstanding recreation opportunities and care for the nationally significant natural resources of the Upper Arkansas River Valley. CPW maintains a Citizen Task Force comprising of no more than 16 members to serve as representatives of eight public interests. The CTF shall provide recommendations to CPW for the management of the AHRA.

- 3. Diverse management approach. Multiple agencies must work together. Where conflict over goals and objectives occurs. balance and compromise should be found that recognizes the value of authorized recreational activities without diminishing

North Slope Recreation Area

Location: Colorado Established: 1992

Land Manager: Colorado Springs Utilities

Partners: City, USFS, State, County, Pikes Peak Highway

Colorado Springs Utilities, an enterprise of the City of Colorado Springs, owns and operates the North Slope Recreation Area for the management of water supply, storage, and infrastructure protection and manages the lands and forests to reduce impacts from insects and disease, wildfire, and erosion. The North Slope Recreation Area was opened by city resolution and involved planning and stakeholder involvement regarding

Pikes Peak America's Mountain provides rangers to patrol the properties and manage the recreation area and access. Allowable activities include hiking, biking, and limited fishing and boating in select reservoirs. Utilities owns approximately 3,900 acres in the North

Key Take Aways

- 1. Utilities works closely with forest and land managers to stretch 1. Scope of services provided is heavily dollars and expand work into adjacent lands, not operated by focused on fire mitigation and forest Utilities, but are part of the watershed. Utilities has partnered restoration and expanding partnerships with with the U.S. Forest Service and Colorado State Forest Service multiple agencies to manage forests. to implement forest improvement and fire mitigation plans.
- Peak Watershed Forest Management Program has occurred with a recreation manager. on the North Slope. It is estimated that \$1.7 million has been spent on wildfire mitigation as related to forest restoration and 3. Funding methods include passes, fees, permits, GOCO, wildfire hazard reduction from 2000-2013, averaging \$1,000/ federal and state grants and funding agreements.

Pikes Peak Region Application

- 2. Permit system in place to collect a small fee 2. The majority of Utilities work completed through the Pikes towards maintenance and patrol of the areas arranged


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
