- -- loss of the city's majestic view heritage (the development WILL block views of the hogbacks and even Pikes Peak ---- the massive amount of apartments approved for the west side in the last several years are simply excessive --Colorado Springs has a very low rating for neighborhood parks that people can walk to from their homes causing open space parks like Ute Valley Park and Blodgett to become degraded from overuse.

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Dear City Councilmembers:

Regarding the Rocky Mountain Bighorn Sheep, our state mammal and popular tourist draw: They are classified on the state level as a "species of greatest conservation concern" and on the federal level as a "sensitive species."[1] These classifications are warnings that steps need to be taken now to prevent the species from being listed as endangered in the future.[2] In light of these current conservation classifications, it can be reasonably argued that all BHS-use areas are critical to their well being.

City planning and NES both deceptively presented to the planning commission only <u>half</u> of a Colorado Parks and Wildlife (CPW) opinion about further development on 2424 Garden of the Gods Road and the Rampart Range Herd of Rocky Mountain Bighorn Sheep. They presented the half that says development would have "*little to no impact*" on the bighorn.[3] The full opinion was that there would be little to no impact <u>because</u> the bighorn do not use the property. A CPW letter explained the opinion was based on <u>one</u> CPW employee saying he never saw bighorn on the property, and didn't know anyone who had.[4] The opinion was easily discredited by a trove of photos, videos and eyewitness accounts of bighorn utilizing the property regularly and in significant numbers.

Fortunately there is no need to use a discredited *opinion* in your decision-making process as you can use a credible **study** instead. The USDA Forest Service did a comprehensive study of Rocky Mountain bighorn sheep including the Rampart Range Herd.[5] That study recognizes Glenn Eyrie and all areas surrounding Glenn Eyrie as primary bighorn habitat. It tells us **"Sheep are currently found primarily in Queen's Canyon Quarry, Camp Creek, and the areas surrounding Glen Eyrie."** And the study makes recommendations regarding development in those areas: "Human recreational activities, especially hikers with dogs, and development are other big factors affecting the future of the Rampart Range Herd. Both are expected to increase as development on private lands within the unit continues (Dreher 2005a). Efforts to funnel recreational activity away from sheep use areas and to <u>curtail development on private lands</u> in critical areas will benefit the Rampart Range bighorns."

When considering the bighorn, 2424 GOTGR and city code 7.3.504HS, it's important to know that wildlife migration is: "...the seasonal movement of animals from one habitat to another in search of food, better conditions, or reproductive needs." And wildlife corridors are: "The routes that wildlife use to move across the landscape between significant habitat areas." [6] In winter, BHS from the Rampart Range Herd are frequently seen utilizing the sunny open space on 2424 as winter range habitat -- that's a seasonal connection. In early spring, The open space becomes birthing habitat as well -- another seasonal connection. [7] And groups of bighorn move through 2424 to get to the low-density developed areas of Mountain Shadows, for water, safety, and grazing as do other wildlife -- that's the moving-across-the-landscape connection.

Please view the linked-to videos, video stills and photos (below) showing the bighorn as they graze and rest on 2424 and move through that landscape to reach other areas of habitat. And please note the final photo that shows the wildlife corridor of which 2424 GOTGR is an integral part.[7-17]

Colorado Parks and Wildlife (CPW) has analyzed the project proposal for 2424 W Garden of the Gods Rd. which includes a review of a master plan amendment, zone change and a concept plan for future site development. CPW is very familiar with the project site that borders the intersection of W. Garden of the Gods Rd. and N. 30th St. to its southeast and borders Flying W Ranch Rd. to its east.

CPW is also aware that there is local community concern that the change in zoning and the new development in the project area could have a negative impact on the local Rampart Range Bighorn Sheep herd that lives nearby. CPW appreciates the communities concern for the Bighorn Sheep and we would like to share our professional opinion on the project.

District Wildlife Manager (DWM) Corey Adler is assigned to the district that incorporates this proposed project location. DWM Adler has worked with the Rampart Range Bighorn Sheep herd intensively through counts, observations, trappings, and hunting activities. DWM Adler's work with these sheep mainly occurs on their primary habitat and favored location of the old mining scar and the steep hillsides nearby. These habitats lie roughly west and up the hill from the proposed project site.

The Glen Eyrie and The Navigators, properties closer to the proposed project area, are places where DWM Adler has also consistently seen the sheep from the Rampart Range Bighorn sheep herd grazing, resting and moving through. In addition to the before mentioned areas the Rampart Range sheep are also seen using and moving through the property of the Flying W Ranch. The sheep will move north through the Flying W Ranch to areas along Lanagan St. and then farther north to the Castle Concrete rock quarry west of Allegheny Dr.

During the times DWM Adler has dealt with the Rampart Range Bighorn Sheep herd he has never seen or heard of the sheep being on or using the proposed project area. The Rampart Range Bighorn sheep's main habitat lies uphill in elevation on the old mining scar and in and around the precariously step walls of Queen's Canyon and any of the other steep hillsides and rock faces of the Rampart Range.

Included with this proposed project is a 55.43 acres open space that will lie west of any new development and between the development and any possible sheep use or movement. This open space will buffer any impact into areas where the sheep may pass through to get to more suitable habitat.

It is DWM Adler and CPW's professional opinion that any new development at the proposed project site at 2424 W Garden of the God's Rd. will have little to no impact on the Rampart Range Bighorn Sheep herd.







The next photos (except for reference photo) show the bighorn as they rest, graze and move through the property. Again, some with tracking collars. When the bighorn graze they are performing an important service for free. One bighorn consumes at least 3 pounds of vegetation in a day. There have been over 40 sheep at a time regularly grazing on and crossing through 2424. In winter, they increase nibbling of highly-flammable mountain mahogany.

You and I have spoken about and exchanged email regarding this project before, so my purpose here is to reaffirm the concerns I have for our Kissing Camels Community.

The majority of residents in our area, well over 1,000, have had to evacuate at least once...some twice...and several lost their homes to wildfire in Mountain Shadows. Having attended community meetings, talked with the Wildfire prevention folks at CSFD, talked with the PPROEM folks, and discussed this with other sister HOA group, our #1 issue is that Colorado Springs has no fully developed and stress tested evacuation plan. What we have is a software program that carves the geography into manageable sizes for emergency communication via the PeakAlerts system, on the assumption folks sign up. I identified this at a public meeting and the response from the speaker was, "Don't worry; we'll get you out." This is completely unacceptable. A solid Disaster/Evaluation Plan would vet various high probability scenarios and contingencies, model worst case scenarios (time of day, weather, traffic, comms, construction etc.) and chart out how and where people would be evacuated. To my knowledge none of this exists and, until it does, City Council should put the brakes on new development on the West Side. Do the hard work BEFORE new developments are considered. The City owes this to the residents who are already here, and it is not delivering.

I and others of like mind have been painted with the NIMBY brush. Not so. Personally, I invested four years of volunteer service as Chair of the EDC, and the Chamber & EDC. My personal involvement in and commitment to thoughtful economic development in our community has a long history. We need more affordable housing. We need alternatives, from vertical development to redevelopment of older neighborhoods. We need a legislative effort to push back on construction defect laws and start building affordable condos again. We cannot just stick our heads in the sand. I totally get it. But doing the hard work called for in evacuation planning, specifically for wildfires, must come first. Not to do so simply puts even more citizens at risk. As the CSFD says, "It's not a question of 'if' we will have another wildfire; it's a question of 'when'."

Again, we've talked. You know my position. And you were even gracious enough to speak to our Association a few months ago. (Tonight we are hosting CSFD for a community town hall on Wildfire Risk... that's how seriously we take this.) I appreciate your acumen and hard work – please ensure my communication on this topic is widely distributed, particularly to those who will make the decision.

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Gentleman,

I'm writing to express my strong opposition to the proposed 2424 GoG development.

My wife and I moved into Mountain Shadows in 2003 when we retired from 32 years of Air Force active duty. We had been stationed here twice and decided to retire here for many reasons. Key among them were the views, parks and trails, cost of living, and the *general warmth of the people*. There was little concern for our's, or broarder public safety. My wife taught in both D-11 and D-20. As a VP with Northrop Grumman, I sought to involve our company in meaningful ways with the city and its future. I led the construction of our building on the airport complex. We committed heavily to United Way, Home Front Cares and other public service non-profits, and I served a term on the then Chamber of Commerce. I felt at home and optimistic for our city's future. When I traveled for business (extensively) or for pleasure, I enjoyed speaking to folks about the Springs and why it was such a great place to live. My position on that now is far less positive. It is far more cautionary and conditional....sadly, for a growing list of reasons. Over development, traffic, crime and associated public safety concerns are key among them. *They have become prevalent, negative conditions and 2024 GoG will arguably compound all of them.*

I know you are very familiar with voiced public concerns regarding 2024 GoG's impact on traffic density and emergency evacuation. I add my voice to these concerns and objections! My wife barely made it out of Mountain Shadows before our home was damaged; the home next to us was incinerated; and, two of our neighbors eight houses away were killed. While the City has acted to address those continued risks, I have little confidence that our current plans and readiness have been sufficiently tested. Are YOU prepared to bet a citizen's life on them? Are you convinced that 2424 GoG would have acceptable risk on the public's interest?

I understand we have a housing shortage. There is substantial, established argument for residential housing development of varying kinds; but, that should not, in my opinion, outweigh the objections you are hearing from current residents.

This part of town is packed, and it's getting worse (Centennial & Fillmore). There may be one good reason for 2424. There are many reasons for refusing to allow this development to proceed.
