Community Outreach:

- 1. The HRC invited fellow Colorado HRCs to participate in a 2-day conflict resolution seminar conducted by the Department of Justice. Eighteen commissioners from Front Range communities attended the seminar to practice conflict resolution techniques and share best practices.
- 2. Supported "Neighbor Up!" Event in April 2015. Provided participants with landlord-tenant resources and offered HRC skills to moderate neighborhood conversations.
- 3. Hosted a table at the "Creating Community" breakfast held by Citizens Project.
- 4. Provided a booth at the "Summer Fest" in Southeast COS; provided over 1,000 neighborhood attendees resources regarding landlord-tenant initiatives.
- 5. Commissioners participated in Coffee with Council in July 2015.

- 6. August monthly HRC meeting was held at the Southeast YMCA and a panel of experts from United Way, Continuum of Care and the Independence Center conducted a panel discussion on the COS Homeless Continuity of Care plan and winter planning initiatives.
- 7. Attended City Council's open forum for the Sit-Lie Ordinance discussions & continued the dialogue by meeting with law enforcement and city council members at the HRC October meeting.
- Hosted a panel discussion on Employment for Re-entering Offenders at the East Library; panelist included the Pikes Peak Workforce Center and representation from the 4th Judicial District's Minority Overrepresentation Committee
- 9. Organized and distributed community "thank you" banners to first responders following the Planned Parenthood shootings.
- Partnered with the COS Community Outreach & Development (Amiee Cox, et al.) and moderated community forums between the Springs Rescue Mission and Mill Street Neighborhood regarding the expansion of SRM
- 11. Moderated community dialogue between COS, Salvation Army & Lowell Neighborhood regarding the temporary warming center's operations.
