

# DRAFT FACILITIES MASTER PLAN Citizen Input/Comments -- thru end of day December 4, 2016

## October 5, 2016

Why is Shooks Run important to you? Provide a story about your interaction with Shooks Run: I have lived on prospect street across from mid. Shooks Run for 20 years. It is so beautiful but walking here gets sad. There is trash always and now homeless sites. Pollutants from Patty Jewett in water equals no or very sparse wild life. such a neglected area-even d11 is a mess. Money lack isn't a great excuse for not caring inexpensively for our community. The lack of care is so obvious for 20 years now. I wonder if a whole big project asking for millions of dollars and 30-50 years completion will do what a healthy community needs. A healthy community needs common sense, care, and respect-all of which

don't cost much.

What I feel is most important for the Envision Shooks Run study to address and/or consider is: The present-now. The trash in and around the creek and the homeless set up camps. and why do we have to put more poison on the ground to fertilize. Also Patty Jewett run off in Shooks Run equals no wildlife. a stream should be inviting to sit near and admire--not to be feared or turned off to by the obvious lack of respect. I am concerned that more and more tax money will be wasted-when trash and keeping the city clean cannot not only take a rocket scientist to figure out how to do. The dozens of trash companies are tearing up the streets and alleys with no care for the citizens who want some quiet-and the city cannot even keep this growing city clean? Dan, I have really enjoyed delving into your final draft report (online version). So much info, so well presented. Thank you and all who produced it -- an inviting, very professional document, including many beautiful renderings of projected improvements. (All the people figures look healthy and trim, so maybe one result of these improvements will be a more physically fit population.). Also, the renderings show a surprising amount of topographical three-dimensionality which one might not have expected to be present.

One unexpected strength was the group of citations (pages 18, 19...) of projects/planning already underway. This helps build confidence that your planning effort is not just a paper project.

Since it is a draft, I will pose a couple of questions:

1) The discussion seems to hedge on how all this connects to the north end of the Legacy Loop (to go west on Rock Island Trail). The stream is there, but no trail is shown. Maybe it is in the discussion somewhere, but I don't see it in the maps (page 88 Headwaters Segment Continued). In other words, is it possible to be more specific about what you propose in this segment for completing the Legacy Loop? In discussion of Shooks Run waters being diverted by the Van Buren Diversion, would it be informative

to mention the upstream diversion by the Templeton Gap Floodway, which carries an enormous amount of water during heavy rains?

There are many hurdles ahead. Bon voyage!

I live in the 1400 block of Custer Avenue. The creek runs through my backyard. My house sits next to the walkway and bridge over the creek. While I believe that flood and erosion control of the creek is a great idea, I don't believe that putting a bike path along the 1400 block of Custer Avenue next to the creek is a good idea. The configuration of the land next to the creek, in my opinion, does not lend itself to widening the land next to the creek enough for a bike path. The result of widening would be the loss of too much property for the homeowners in this block.

Instead I favor moving the bike path away from the creek a block or two before the Patty Jewett property line.

## Suggested changes:

Table of Contents: Darken the sub-headings font.

All page numbers: Darken the font, at least each page number (all are nearly invisible in low light).

Page 25: Second photo should be labeled Kiowa Street, not Willamette.

Page 28: "Vegetation & Wetlands" should include Crack Willow (Salix fragilis), which is co-dominant with the Plains

Cottonwood along the creek. Very little Tree of Heaven is present along the creek in the parks (so far).

Page 30: Table 1: Middle Shooks Run Park also contains a half-court basketball facility.

Page 31: Central Corridor: Remove "heavy industrial" use on the western side of the stream; add commercial.

Page 80: Last paragraph: Platte "Street" should read "Avenue".

Page 86: Enlarge "Patty Jewett Golf Course" label in middle of map.

To Senior City Engineer Aaron Egbert, Public Relations Lisa Bachman, and for further notice to Members of the Planning Commission and Colorado Springs City Council,

I would like to thank Mr. Egbert and Project Manager Dan Krueger for taking the time to meet personally at the Bijou bridge site to discuss the intended long-term plan.

For the record, I've been a property owner on Bijou Street for many years and new owner of the commercial property at El Paso Street near the Shooks Run trail.

Having ready access and interaction with the downtown hub is very important to us and, I understand, relevant to a mixed-use vision for the area.

For reasons of potential limited traffic, visibility, and restricted access, a closure of Bijou Street at North Corona Street, east of Wahsatch Avenue presents a very real impact upon the viability of the commercial property at our location.

There are additional downsides to a closure, including an increase in the transient impact in a would-be more secluded park area, and the necessity of on-going maintenance of an open waterway (as evidenced following the prior waterway reconstruction south of Kiowa Street). As discussed, the culvert under East Bijou Street at N. Corona is aged and requires eventual removal or replacement; however, no immediate plan exists to remove the culvert/bridge, and future progress may allow the bridge to remain open if the southern stretch of the culvert could be removed and the drainage reconfigured without removing the bridge.

I would like to see the bridge remain open for as long as possible, and, in the event that final closure becomes essential, that provision be maintained for <u>clear visibility</u> and access from the El Paso corridor to the entrance of the property at 560 E. Bijou.

Again, thank you for your consideration of these material issues.
