



Judicial Nominating Committee Responses, for Candidate Ed Colt

- 1. I want this position because it appears to be a good fit for me in that I have extensive experience as a judge, both as a district court judge and as a municipal court judge. I retired from the district court bench in the fall of 2016 and, while I appreciate many aspects of retirement, I think that I have the background and energy to do a good job for the court.
- 2. I believe that I am a fast learner. In my job in district court, new topics presented continually, so that judges needed to learn new areas every day. This was particularly true when I presided in Cripple Creek, as that job required familiarity with every aspect of district court, to include criminal law, civil law, dependency and neglect, divorce, etc.
- 3. Efficient management of dockets is always a challenge, and is more of an art than a science. For criminal dockets, for example, I always tried to call in-custody defendants first, where possible, then quick matters where counsel was involved, leaving actual hearings for later in the docket.

One of the most difficult organizational tasks that fell to me was to organize the jury selection and trial in a death penalty case in Cripple Creek. The case had gotten extensive pre-trial publicity and because it

was a death penalty case, extensive individual voir dire was required. Making the task more difficult was that the case was called an in a court house built in 1904, which provided its own set of issues.

- 4. Judicial demeanor is critical to the role of the court. I have found that it is important to not let things spin out of control. By that I mean that if you let one litigant yell at another party, then the other party feels entitled to act the same way. By correcting bad behavior immediately, and by setting the Court's expectations out clearly, you can often steer the proceedings into more productive areas.
- 5. Self-represented litigants are an increasing part of most courts' dockets and present some challenges. One of the challenges is posed in the questions, that is, what is the proper role of a judge in handling evidence in a case where a pro se litigant does not object to inadmissible evidence? Can the judge properly even the playing field?

I do not see a simple answer to this question, and it seems to come up most often in the context of hearsay statements and hearsay documents. I think it is probably true that the Court should avoid admitting clearly inadmissible evidence, and I know of no rule which formally approves of admitting inadmissible evidence in order to level the playing field. It will always be a struggle to balance the quest for truth in finding the facts with the rules of evidence. It seems to make the most sense to avoid accepting inadmissible evidence in the first place,

then you avoid a fairness argument later--"Judge, you let him introduce hearsay, now you say that I can't do the same!"

- 6. Regarding decision making, it is helpful to analyze any issue by determining who has the burden of proof, and to apply common-sense analysis of the credibility of witnesses. An example of a difficult decision was very early on in my years on the city court bench. It was a red light trial. The police officer indicated he'd staked out an intersection for red light violations, and testified credibly that the defendant had entered the intersection after the light had turned red. The defendant motorist testified credibly that the light was yellow when he entered the intersection. I asked the parties whether they had any additional witnesses, and the answer was no. In this case, I found for the city, reasoning that the officer was at the intersection for the specific purpose of looking for violations, that he had chosen his location so that he could observe the car, the stop bar and the light, while the motorist was not likely as concentrated on all these factors.
- 7. Your job as judge is to make decisions by applying the law as it exists, not to alter the law to a different form you might prefer.
- 8. I think that I am clear on the time commitments required and the expectations that come with the job.

9. Being a judge is isolating, and I have dealt with these issues in the past. I do not have a legal practice and little in the way of business relationships. I do not see a difficulty in regard to social relationships.
