 - City street pavement etc. maintained by City; Districts may maintain "extras"

- -Parcels may have more than one dwelling unit
- -In mid-February of 2018, the reported numbers were 134,762 total parcels with 9,121 in metropolitan districts

Other Special District Powers and Functions (In addition to taxation/assessment/debt issuance)



- Staffing
- Property ownership and maintenance
- Other services
- Condemnation
- Contracts and IGAs
- Fees
- Parks and related properties

District Staffing



- Other than LIDs and SIMDs, districts are authorized to hire their own dedicated staff- but seldom do
- With SIMDs, the staff are dedicated City employees
- GIDs could have staff, but there really is no need
- Essentially all metropolitan districts, BIDs and the DDA contract for services
- The Planning & Community Development Department maintains lists of district management and attorney contacts
 - Current Lists attached

Other District Services



Examples of other services*

- Streetscape landscaping and maintenance
- Stormwater facilities
- Parks of various types and sizes
- Common area maintenance
- Community centers
- Parking areas, drive aisles or garages
 - Sometimes including snowplowing
- Covenant enforcement
- Trash removal
- Internet/broadband
- Public art/ entry features
- Augmented security
- Marketing and business retention

^{*} Not all services statutorily allowed by all types of districts; metropolitan district service plans must specify their services

Condemnation



- Not directly relevant for SIMDs and LIDs
- Statutorily authorized for GIDs (but Council- as GID boardwould be the entity doing the condemnation)
- Not allowed by statute for BIDs
- Statutes authorize metropolitan districts to condemn, but Special District Policy and Model Service Plans preclude without Council approval

District Fees



- "Fees, rates, tolls and charges" are generally allowed except for "end user debt service fees"
- Building permit or platting fees are acceptable
- Fees for specific services such as solid waste removal, internet, facility use
- Fees related to traditional HOA role (common area maintenance, covenant enforcement, etc.)

Property Ownership and Maintenance



- Trend toward district ownership of property and assets
 - Especially for metropolitan districts
 - Wide variety of examples
- SIMDs and GIDs do not own properties directly
- District-owned land and assets ordinarily tax-exempt

Electors and Elections



- Electors vary by type of district
 - Typically including property owners
- Board of directors elections every two years in may
 - Staggered 4-year terms
- TABOR elections dates (Constitutional)
 - Three times every two years
 - Every November, and on may special district election date
