




Firearm Suicide Deaths

Youth Suicide Deaths





The Suicide Prevention Collaborative of El Paso County is working to reduce the local rate of suicide deaths by 20% between 2019 and 2024. Rates show us the proportion within the population, allowing us to track progress in a way that accounts for population growth.



Over half of all suicide deaths in Fl Paso County were by firearm. There was an 11% increase between 2020 and 2021. but a 4% decrease in 2022.
